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FROM THE PASTOR:

Therefore, I urge you brothers and sisters . . . to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship (Romans 12:1)

In the modern church, we call it having "A Servant's Heart." Being willing, humbly, to serve in the name of Jesus Christ. To serve in Jesus' name is to serve out of love— agape love, "God's love," unconditionally and sacrificially. James advises us, "faith without deeds is a dead faith" (James 2:25).

Paul tells us that God's Spirit gives us gifts so that we may serve in the name of Christ (1 Corinthians 12:4-6). Whatever talent, skill, or blessing God has provided is to be used in His name to love God and to serve others (Romans 12:5). The Greatest Commandment, to "love God and to love others as yourself" follows Jesus' teachings on "the practice of your righteousness"— serving others, in Matthew 6. Here Jesus tells us we are not to serve "to be honored by others" (V2), that our reward will come from the Father himself (V4).

God's gifts of the Spirit also come from learning with training and what is "helpful for building others up" (Ephesians 4:29). None of us develop our gifts without the help of others. So, God may call you to something that you need to learn and, in this way, provides His gifts to you by working through others. When I received my call to ministry, my only view was from the outside— a pastor worked an hour on Sunday and told people what to do! The truth was that I had no idea. It took time and the gifts of others to turn me into a pastor . . . to serve others.

Now it is always good to be kind and show appreciation to others. Paul writes, "Honor one another above yourselves" (Romans 12:10). But serving in the name of Jesus must start from our love for Jesus and, by what he did humbly and sacrificially for us, in the same way we are to serve. He tells us quite poignantly in Luke 17:10, "So you also, when you have done everything you were told to do, should say, 'We are unworthy servants; we have only done our duty."

We serve out of love, in the name of the One who loved and served us first.

SPOTLIGHT ON STAFF

Each month over the next several, we will be highlighting one of Emanuel's staff positions so the church can better understand its purpose.

Pastor Rev. Dr. Ronald C. Bupp



If you asked a hundred church goers what a pastor is, you'd get a hundred different definitions all related to how the individual church member, personally, sees and relates to this person called "pastor."

The biblical definition of a pastor comes from Greek meaning "shepherd." Added to this from Latin is the verb "to feed." So, a pastor is someone, who has been called by God to be a shepherd to God's people and, as Jesus says in John 12, "Feed my sheep." And so, the pastor of a church is called to preach, teach, pray, and counsel his congregation, "feeding" them God's word.

The Methodist Church identifies the pastor as one who is called through ordination to Word, Sacrament, Order, and Service. Word—to preach, teach, and counsel in the way of Jesus Christ; Sacrament—officiate/preside over Baptism and Holy Communion; Order—Oversee the life of the local church in keeping with the rules and processes of the denomination and laws of government; and Service—providing pastoral care and guiding the church for service in mission and ministry.

Education, experience, and maturity are vital to being a successful pastor. Pastor Ron has a doctorate degree in Ministry, Master of Divinity and Master of Business Administration degrees, and a bachelor's degree in business. As a "second career" pastor, he has thirty plus years of organizational and personnel management, and public speaking experience. He has sixteen years of experience in local church pastoring, with a specialty in intentional, interim, transitional ministry or in laymen's terms— church crisis management.

"If I had to sum up the word 'pastor' in one sentence" he says, "It would be a firm commitment to sharing the truth of Jesus Christ with love and compassion in every aspect of life."
